



COVID-19 Enforcement Summary

(as of 12/10/2020)

- 6,093 Coronavirus Inspections Opened (many still open)
 - 4,215 State Plan
 - 1,345 Federal
 - 263 Inspections w/ Coronavirus-Related Citations issued (12/3/20)
- 72,198 State Plan Complaints/Referrals
- 23,943 Federal Complaints/Referrals
 - 2,680 Healthcare
 - 1,347 Retail Trade (191 Grocery Stores)
 - 688 Restaurants and Other Eating Places
 - 342 Construction
- **3,581** Whistleblower Complaints (**782** Docketed for Investigation)

Most Cited Standards in COVID-19 Inspections

- **1** Provide a medical evaluation before a worker is fit-tested or uses a respirator.
- **2** Perform an appropriate fit test for workers using tight fitting respirators.
- 3 Assess the workplace to determine if COVID-19 hazards are present, or likely to be present, which will require the use of a respirator and/or other personal protective equipment (PPE).
- 4 Establish, implement, and update a written respiratory protection program with required worksite-specific procedures.
- S Provide an appropriate respirator and/or other PPE to each employee when necessary to protect the health of the employees (ensuring the respirator and/or PPE used is the correct type and size).

Most Cited Standards in COVID-19 Inspections

- **6** Train workers to safely use respirators and/or other PPE in the workplace, and retrain workers about changes in the workplace that might make previous training obsolete.
- Store respirators and other PPE properly in a way to protect them from damage, contamination, and, where applicable, deformation of the facepiece and exhalation valve.
- 8 For any fatality that occurs within 30 days of a work-related incident, report the fatality to OSHA within eight hours of finding out about it.
- 9 Keep required records of work-related fatalities, injuries, and illness.



Statistics

Construction's "Fatal Four"

- Out of 4,779 worker fatalities in private industry during 2018, 1,008 (21% construction)
- Eliminating the Fatal Four would save 591 workers' lives in America every year (58.6% of construction deaths)
- The leading causes of worker deaths (excluding highway collisions) in the 1,008 construction fatalities:
 - Falls 338 (33.5%)
 - Struck by Object 112 (11.1%)
 - Electrocutions 86 (8.5%)
 - Caught-in/between* 55 (5.5%) (* caught-in or compressed by equipment or objects, and struck, caught, or crushed in collapsing structure, equipment, or material)

Site-Specific Targeting 2016 (SST-16)





- Uses injury and illness information electronically submitted by employers for calendar year (CY) 2016
- Targets high injury rate establishments in both manufacturing and nonmanufacturing (does not include construction)
- Allows the most effective use of resources in areas with the greatest need

Health Issues in Construction

Opioids in Construction

- One of the highest injury rates when compared to other industries and opioids have commonly been prescribed to construction workers to treat the pain caused by these occupational injuries
- Overdose deaths that occurred on the job increased by over 30% between 2015 and 2016
- OSHA supports NIOSH, CPWR, and NSC in sharing ideas

Suicides in Construction on the increase

- The rate in construction is 4 times greater than the national rate for all industries
