

In-House Ergonomics Standards

In a previous article we talked about the essentials of a practical, basic ergonomics program. In my opinion, having a set of in-house standards makes ergonomics easier for everyone involved. These standards are culled from the multitude of credible sources out there and condensed into a short, accessible list which ergonomics teams, engineers, supervisors and employees can understand and use. Along with some very basic tools, such as a fishing scale and a tape measure, anyone who has some good standards will find ergonomics easier to handle.

In-house standards are at the top of my list of important elements of an ergonomics program, even if I listed them fifth in the last article. To develop our in-house standards, first we need to look at what we know about the effects of physical demands on the human body. Here are some of the basic philosophies behind injury prevention through ergonomics.

- 1. Deep bending to lift, or even repetitive stooping when not lifting anything, will nearly always result in back injuries if done over the long term.
- 2. Reaching above the shoulder will nearly always result in shoulder injuries if done repetitively. Reaching with the hands more than about 12 inches from the rib cage can do the same thing if done for the majority of the cycle time.
- Bending slightly, or reaching upward slightly can cause lower back and shoulder problems if done for majority of the cycle time.
- 4. Forceful hand movements will cause hand and wrist disorders in some portion of operators, especially when there is pinch grip, twisting, direct pressure on the palm, or rapid manipulation of small parts. Any motion that can be eliminated should be if it can be done in an economically practical way.

- 5. Repetitive lifting has to be kept to a very low weight limit or it will cause back injuries.
- 6. Making someone exclusively do the same small task over and over will result in some injury when the work is forceful or requires awkward postures of any part of the body.

And so on. Knowing these "rules" are pretty reliable I came up with a list of suggested ergonomic in-house standards to take the place of the absent government regulations. This list is aimed at manufacturing, but could be adjusted for other professions such as some construction trades.

Postures:

- 1. Limit repetitive reaching to <12 inches from front of rib cage (for heavier workers will require shorter distance 8" to 10" from foremost obstruction to hand destinations)
- 2. No lifting to load or unload pallets (or repetitive reaching for controls) with hands below knees or above shoulders optimum: lifting and repetitive reaching at elbow height (35 45 inches)
- When assembling parts or loading fixtures, work at elbow height (between 35" and 45")(Discrepancy with #2 related to % of cycle time spent in posture)
- 4. Elbows at sides while working: work height of fingers same as elbow height
- 5. Parts and fixture all on the same plane
- 6. Hand tools: handles $1" 1 \frac{1}{4}$ " diameter, 5" 6" long, rounded ends, lightweight materials where feasible, knurl or coat for grippiness (aluminum, polycarbonate, etc. can usually be used for handles with steel inserts used for tool shafts or tips)
- 7. Locate initiation switches at a height (elbow height is optimal) and angle that allow straight wrists and fingers when using (optimum angle adjustable)
- 8. Operator touchscreens and monitors at about 55" 65" from floor level optimum height and angle adjustable

Forces (should be as minimal as practical)

- 9. No manual moving of drums other than empties
- 10. No hand lifting over 30 pounds, simple lifts only
- 11. Limit initial forces to < 40 lbs, sustained push/pull forces to <20 lbs when moving pallet jacks or carts
- 12. Assembly push force no more than two pounds
- 13. Pinch grip less than 2 pounds, briefcase grip less than 10 pounds, for any grip >10 seconds
- 14. Foot pedal force less than 10 pounds
- 15. Springs set by machine not by hand
- 16. Any in-process container lifted by hand is better with handles

Repetition:

- 17. Initiation switches use optical sensors rather than spring loaded buttons
- 18. Initiation switches mounted on individual pods if necessary to minimize obstruction of common mounting box
- 19. Engineer out flipping motions/dishrag hand motions where feasible
- 20. Suspend tools close to point of use, positioned at angle of use, tool torque controlled by suspension, minimum force required to move to point of use.
- 21. Tools and equipment expose hands of operators to only minimal vibration
- 22. Primary operator protection light curtains, muted during non-hazardous portions of cycle; initiation by single hand or foot switch, "trip" better than "controls" where controls not required for protection.
